James Lane was appointed Virginia's 25th superintendent of public instruction by the Governor of Virginia, effective June 1, 2018. As state superintendent, Dr. Lane serves as the executive officer of the Virginia Department of Education, which is the administrative agency for the

Commonwealth's public schools. He also serves as secretary of the state Board of Education.

Prior to his appointment as the Commonwealth's chief school officer, Dr. Lane served as a division superintendent in Chesterfield County, Goochland County and Middlesex County. He was recognized as the 2017 Virginia Superintendent of the Year for his leadership in Goochland County. Dr. Lane was one of 100 superintendents in the nation selected to attend the 2014 ConnectEd Superintendents Summit at the White House in recognition of his leadership in the use of instructional technology by his schools. In 2015, the national Data Quality Campaign awarded its annual Flashlight award to Goochland County in recognition of the division's achievements under Lane's leadership in using data to empower educators and communicate with parents and the public.

As the Virginia Superintendent of Public Instruction, Dr. Lane leads the Commonwealth's Virginia is for Learners initiative — a commitment to ensure that every public school student is ready to thrive after graduation. Education is the most effective tool to reduce poverty, address social challenges, and sustain economic advancement for all Virginians. The Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) is prioritizing equity and building a broad coalition of support that represents stakeholders from across the Commonwealth to ensure every student graduates with life ready skills that include the 5 C's — critical thinking, creative thinking, communication, collaboration and citizenship. Under Dr. Lane's leadership, the Commonwealth is committed to ensuring that students and families, regardless of their race, economic status, or native language, feel welcome in school and have access to the resources they need to succeed. Dr. Lane holds a doctorate in education from the University of Virginia, a master's degree in school administration from North Carolina State University, and master's and bachelor's degrees in teaching from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Dr. Lane and his wife, Sarah, are the parents of two elementary school students in Chesterfield County.

Leah serves on the Virginia Indian Advisory Board and the Governor's Advisory Board for Service and Volunteerism and devotes her time to mentoring young women in Richmond. In 2018, Style Weekly named Leah to its annual "Power List" as one of the most influential people in education in the Richmond region.

Dedicated to disrupting structural racism, Leah utilizes communications savvy, public relations expertise, and innovative outreach tactics to galvanize support for social justice and to advance inclusive learning environments for all students.

Leah earned her Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Hampton University, and a Master's of Public Administration from Virginia Commonwealth University. She is the proud mother of two teenage daughters, Alexandra and Adriana.

Stephanie Malia Krauss is a senior director at JFF.

In that role, she helps leaders design solutions that improve the economic well-being of young people and families—especially those

living in poverty. She works with national, state and local changemakers to make sure everyone has the chance to experience quality learning and work opportunities and livable lives.

Previously, as a senior fellow with the Corporation for a Skilled Workforce, the Forum for Youth Investment, and JFF, she focused on youth readiness and well-being, credentialing, competency-based education, and opportunity youth. She was also campaign director of Connecting Credentials and co-director of The Readiness Project.

Stephanie also founded and led Shearwater Education Foundation, and the first competency-based high school for disconnected youth in St. Louis.

She started her career as an elementary school teacher and soccer coach in Phoenix, Arizona.

Stephanie staffs the Economic Well-Being work group of the Youth Transition Funders Group and is involved in the CASEL Collaborating States Initiative, the AIR Competency-Based Education Research Advisory Board, and the Partnership for the Future of Learning.

She has been a guest commentator on PBS NewsHour, StoryCorps, and public radio. Her book, Making It: What Today's Kids Need for Tomorrow's World, will be released by Jossey-Bass Wiley in January 2021.

Stephanie was drawn to JFF because it is a national platform for building a future that works for everyone. "Many people struggle to get by, and JFF works relentlessly to find ways for them to get the knowledge, skills, and jobs they need to build good lives," she says.

Stephanie and her husband, Evan, met in social work school and have been working for social change ever since. They live in the St. Louis area with their two boys and two dogs.
